As always, none of this would be happening if we didn't have your continued support. Thank you all! Large or small, your donations are always greatly appreciated.



brought in by Animal Control. At last count I saw 20 cats. I am glad they are smart enough to stay away from the traffic on the highway, and as it gets colder they have warm houses lined with straw (one even has electric heat). Of course, all of them were spayed and neutered in our TNR Clinic.








CAT FACTS



The more cats are spoken to, the more they will speak to you.

Cats are definitely not subtle. They let you know exactly what they're thinking and feeling at any given moment - from utter elation to abject depression and everything in between.

Bring home a new baby, and your cat will let you know how jealous she is.

Move to a new home, and she'll let you know that she was happy where she was.

So when you scold, get angry at, or reprimand your cat, don't be surprised if she 'sults' by turning her back on you and refusing - under any condition - to look at you.

Is your cat punishing you by sulking? You may feel that she is, but she's really avoiding eye contact because she feels threatened, but not by the tone of your voice or how loud it was. Most likely, your cat reacted because you stared at her. A cat associates a fixed stare with 'the enemy'.

The dominant cat in any hostile social situation always stares at her rival, who will look away in order to hold her ground while diminishing the potential for increased hostility.

When you stare at your cat in an angry way, you become the dominant rival - even more threatening than another cat, because you're so much bigger.

How Do You Know If Your Cat Is Sick?

Changes in your cat's behavior and bodily functions can be an indication of illness, often a dangerous illness that requires the immediate attention of a veterinarian. If your cat stops urinating or starts urinating excessively or you notice a change in the color of your cat's urine, it might mean liver damage or kidney failure.

Diarrhea or a change in the color of your cat's stool can indicate that she has an intestinal problem or inflammation of the liver. Unusual panting, salivating or swallowing can indicate that there has been an overload of poisonous toxins to your cat's liver or kidneys - or heart problems.

Shallow, rapid breathing can also be an indication of heart problems, serious pain or internal swelling. Stumbling, shaking or tilting of the head could

indicate inner ear or kidney problems or even complications of the brain. Watch for changes in the appearance of your cat's coat. If it looks dull or dry or sparse, there could be a problem.

Even a slight change in normal behavior, like playing less and sleeping more, or eating or drinking less or more, can indicate illness in your feline.

Can People Become Addicted to Cats

A California writer recently wrote about "the upsurge in addiction to felines." He called it *The Attack of the Cat People* and was referring to the fact that as early as 1987, more people owned cats than dogs. This was a dramatic shift from previous years. Furthermore, more money is spent on cat food than on baby food! Over an eight-year period, annual cat food sales doubled to a whopping \$2 billion.

Why is this happening? The most obvious answers reflect our modern lifestyle, which is no longer as convenient to caring responsibly for the needs of a dog as it once was. We are having fewer children, if any, so we live in smaller spaces. Cats don't mind. But dogs need their space.

We work more hours, and more women work out of the home. Cats don't mind that we're not around as often, especially if there's a playmate around, lots of toys, or even a comforable overstuffed chair to curl up on. Dogs can't wait that long to 'take care of business'. They also resent being left alone, and 'take out' their resentment on things like furniture, plants, and in my brother's case with his dog Jinx, expensive shoes.


We are living longer, which means there are more elderly people longing for the companionship and distraction of a pet. It's sometimes hard for an elderly person to take the type of long walks a dog requires. But cats don't mind.

With our modern lifestyle comes a new modern thinking. The experts say that there has been a real shift in the social mood over the past several years. People have a more independent attitude. We have our own ideas, and we express them.

Our relationships at work and at play reflect this new attitude, so think about the relationships we have with our pets. It doesn't seem strange that we would seek out a furry friend who has the same personality. That could only be the cat independent and individualistic, with just the right amount of disrespect to make the relationship challenging!

The number of people who own dogs, that loyal slave who'll fetch your slippers and pipe at the end of a hard day at work - if you first take him for a four-mile hike - has not decreased. It has simply kept up with the increase in the human population over the past several years. The number of cat owners, however, has far exceeded the increase in human population.
